

Household hazardous waste collection in south Santa Rosa

Residents of south Santa Rosa County have the opportunity this month to dispose of household hazardous waste at no charge without having to drive to the Central Landfill in Milton. Amnesty Day will be held from 8 a.m. to noon, March 29 at the Santa Rosa County South Side Service Center, 5819 Gulf Breeze Parkway in Midway. Amnesty Day is not a recycle day, but a special day for disposal of household hazardous waste that should not be thrown out with household garbage.

Citizens can dispose of up to 5 gallons of the following liquid items at no cost: engine and cooking oil, gasoline, paint, antifreeze, lubricants, greases, solvents, pesticides, fertilizers, pool cleaners and household cleaners. Additionally, computers, cathode ray TVs, monitors, printers, fax machines, DVD/DVR players, typewriters, copy machines, battery backups, fluorescent lights, oil filters, and fire extinguishers will also be accepted.

Residents will be required to remove items from their vehicle. Containers larger than 5 gallons will not be accepted. Please note that tires, scrap metal, limbs, yard debris or household garbage will not be accepted as part of Amnesty Day, but may be taken to the Central Landfill located at 6337 Da Lisa Road in Milton at a minimal charge.

Residents are reminded that they can dispose of hazardous household waste at no charge year-round, Mondays through Saturdays from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., at the Household Hazardous Waste Center located at the entrance of the Central Landfill.

Two county recycling centers to close

Santa Rosa County commissioners voted Feb. 27 to permanently close two of the county's 23 recycle drop-off sites. The Tiger Point Park Road and Five Points/Chumuckla Highway recycling drop off sites will permanently close March 14 due to health and safety risks resulting from illegal dumping.

According to a news release from the county, the sites currently have cameras, but costly lighting and equipment upgrades would be necessary to improve the ability to identify or prosecute violators. Non-recyclables including furniture, household garbage, construction debris and even dead animals are illegally dumped at the sites on a regular basis.

Republican Women name new president, Melvin discusses courthouse

selection at a Santa Rosa Federated Republican Women (SRFRW) luncheon Feb. 25 at The Club at Hidden Creek.

Melvin, who will be running for election in District 2, said that the center of population in the county is what drove the courthouse location decision.

"A consultant that we hired came back with the recommendation that the board look within a 2-mile circle of the intersection of Avalon Boulevard and Highway 90," Melvin said. "In broad strokes, you could say that the Milton/Pace area is two-thirds of the population and the peninsula is a third so the location fell on that."

Melvin said that roadway

ratings are what prompted him to prefer the Avalon Boulevard location. However, commissioners voted 3 to 1 in favor of the Highway 90 location.

"I amended the motion that we are not going to buy anything right now," Melvin said. "We identified a piece of property, signed a contract with the seller contingent on the approval of the voters of Santa Rosa County."

Melvin also discussed the county's contract with West Florida Recycling and said that two of the county's recycling collection sites, including the one at Tiger Point Recreation Center,

"West Florida Recycling had a contract with us but they are in default," Melvin said. "You are going to see some signs show up soon at the recycling sites. We are closing them and cleaning

them up because we are on our own right now."

As her last day as president of SRFRW, Martha Brenenstahl discussed her concern with proposed regulation from the Internal Revenue Service — Regulation 134417-13 — that would hinder how political group members can communicate with elected officials.

"I do not support the proposed IRS regulation because it is a restriction on our freedom of speech," Brenenstahl said. "The rule being proposed by the IRS entitled 'Guidance for tax-exempt social welfare organizations for candidate-related political activities' is not guidance at all, but a restriction on our political freedom."

Swarms of revelers lined Stewart Street in Milton Feb. 27 in hopes of catching beads and Moon Pies. Main Street Milton, a downtown revitalization organization, hosted their popular annual Mardi Gras parade.

Bands, floats and motorcycle groups gathered beforehand in the north parking lot of Milton High School. Festive music played as longtime parade coordinator Connie Clark positioned the entries and checked the crowds lining up along the route.

"We have a wonderful turnout," exclaimed Clark, who was joined on the Main Street float by three of her grandchildren. "It's a family-friendly parade. I'm really delighted to see so many people lining the street."

At 6 p.m. the procession headed south on Stewart Street amid throngs of people shouting for beads. Children jumped with excitement

when they would catch candy, beads or stuffed animals tossed randomly into the crowd.

Judges reviewed 22 entries and selected winners for best business, best nonprofit organization and best overall.

Skateland, a local skating rink, was awarded the trophy for best business entry. The enclosed float blared popular hits played at the rink.

The Main Street Milton

float, decorated by volunteers, was recognized as best entry by a nonprofit organization.

The Blackwater Pyrates, a local group which sponsors river cleanups, boater safety

and maritime preservation won the best overall award for their float.

Parade proceeds cover the cost of the parade, including a costly cleanup fee assessed by the city. The remainder will go toward their mission to revitalize the downtown area.

At a post-parade party, board members celebrated the successful event while dining on red beans and rice as happy children played a game of hide and seek at the organization's new headquarters on Escambia Street in downtown Milton.

The group is already making plans for next year. Clark reports city officials are working with her to re-route the parade through the downtown area in the future.
